DID YOU KNOW....

...The black-capped chickadee is a year-round Maplewood resident? Look for this beautiful and busy little bird at the Nature Center, other parks, and in your own yard.

Listen, as well. Chickadee language is complex and sophisticated, according to experts who say that the birds rearrange vocal patterns depending on the circumstances and can make more than 15 distinct calls.

Even the chick-a-dee-dee's namesake call can vary. For instance, the number of "dee-dee" notes

might increase depending on the threat sensed by the chickadee.

If you remain still for a few minutes while listening to this call, you might be able to hear and see why the chickadee has given its alert. (It could be you!)

There's also the two-note "fee-bee" call, and sometimes a barely audible third note can be heard. This song indicates that you're almost surely hearing a male chickadee in late winter and spring. The female chickadee also has a song that is said to be uniquely hers.

Before heading out for your next walk, check the internet to hear various chickadee calls, or download one of the excellent birding apps to your phone.



BATTLE CREEK GRASSLANDS Advocacy Update

There is reason to hope for the preservation of this valuable wildlife habitat.

You may remember that Friends of Maplewood Nature encouraged you to ask Ramsey County to drop plans for development of this 77-acre parcel bordering Battle Creek Park Reserve. You can see portions of the property from the eastern edge of Battle Creek Park, and from Century Avenue, north of the Ramsey County Correctional Facility.

In late 2020, FMN was alerted to the County's plan to sell the land for residential and business development. Since then, FMN, along with other grassroots groups of concerned nature-lovers and environmentalists, has engaged in many hours of listening, research, discussion, letter-writing, and outreach to the public hoping to persuade both Ramsey County and the City of Maplewood to use this opportunity to preserve this habitat.

After hearing from concerned wildlife advocates, Ramsey County engaged a surveyor who confirmed that the grasslands are active nesting habitat for

endangered and rare species that are in severe decline.

Nevertheless, Ramsey County sought proposals for development of the grasslands as well as the recently closed Ponds of Maplewood Golf Course.

However, no proposals were submitted by developers for the grasslands parcel. "The fact that the County received no proposal for the grasslands property supports our point of view that this parcel is not appropriate for housing," noted John Zakelj, Friends of Maplewood Nature president and long-time Audubon Society member. "More and more people have come around and are seeing the unique natural value of that grassland."

Ramsey County rejected all development proposals for the golf course because they failed to meet the County's objectives, according to commissioners.

Development initiatives are on hold pending Ramsey County's decision.

Zakelj said a coalition of grassroots environmental groups will continue lobbying for the grasslands parcel to be permanently added to Battle Creek Regional Park.
